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## Minister's Letter

A Happy Spring to you all!

A phrase I heard last year is one that I know I now repeat too often but I can't help it: the longer I am a Christian the more I realise it's not so much that I need to learn new things about Christ; better that I am simply reminded of the things I already know – and live them out. After two thousand years utterly brand new biblical concepts are to be held in suspicion. What I really need to do is simple - take the old, old story and be reminded of it constantly; reminded of the things I supposedly know but still get wrong.

That concept came back with great clarity recently with R.T. Kendall's latest book: 'Pure Joy.' There is a very strong emphasis on something you will have heard a million times before – a strong call to thankfulness in all things. He and his wife were returning from a ministry trip and as they were driving home his wife suggested that they try to identify fifteen things from their trip for which they should thank God straight away.

Once they got started they ultimately stopped at over thirty. Let's be clear from the outset: -understanding isn't the point here. Getting on with being thankful is the point.

Or would you rather take a step back and think it through and be analytical. The point is to stop the analysis and get on with the thankfulness. Clearly, thinking must have its place. But thinking too much can be just as bad as

not thinking at all – probably worse since pride usually ends up getting added in for good measure when you think too much.

So don't cogitate! Just integrate! Get thankfulness integrated into the marrow of who you are. When you get going then thankfulness becomes an attitude. When you start it doesn't take long to build up a bit of momentum in finding things for which you can give thanks to the Lord. Try it.

I'm not asking you to just agree with my hugely unoriginal point; not do you feel I have adequately illustrated and expanded my point; not will you weigh up my point against the other 186 (?) opening letters that you've read in Scope over the years in this church. Just be thankful.

I assume like countless millions in this country you find the 'expenses' claimed by some MPs in Westminster to be outrageous; nonetheless after a fifteen second glance at the politicians of Italy, the U.S.A. and Eastern Europe give thanks that we still have some of the most honest politicians in the world. I assume you find the 'pensions' of the 'Fred the Shred' and the many other disgraced bankers an affront to ethical business practice; nonetheless recognising how substantial the economic slow down (dead stop for some) actually is give thanks that we are still hugely blessed financially by the God who gives us the talents and

abilities that gives us the income we do have for ourselves and family.

I assume many of you will feel anxious if you see a bunch of 'hoodies' standing at some street corner; nonetheless give thanks that we all know teenagers (actually the overwhelming majority) who are simply stunning human beings and give us hope that the next generation will be much better than this one.

This isn't some vacuous call to synthetic good humour and a permanent grin unconnected to the real world's very real problems. It's the simple observation that in countless staffrooms and work cafeterias, in numerous streets and homes across the land, the simple unremitting avalanche of cynicism, complaining and negativity will drown people. You have to choose: join in (silently or vocally) or maintain an attitude that as Christians we are constantly called to by the Bible.

The Christians in Thessalonica had to face Roman occupation, concern over the destiny of dead Christians and the same universal concerns that you have over their jobs, income and family. Yet what does Paul say to them in their difficulties:

15 See that no one repays anyone evil for evil, but always seek to do good to one another and to everyone.

16 Rejoice always, 17 pray without ceasing, 18 give thanks in all

circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.

This can seem to be not much of a problem; the MPs and the bankers deserve it. I respectfully suggest that's another problem. Certainly one that needs addressing. Meantime, what you can much more readily address is your own lack of thankfulness. Make thankfulness your default setting. Make thankfulness who you are and how you are wired. Make thankfulness what you revise like some student studying for a spring time exam. If you do you will feel the benefit of it – for one thing, you'll live longer. For another, you will make the spiritual temperature of this church rise significantly.

I've just reread the above paragraphs that you have just read. A sudden plea has come to my mind. Please realise, this isn't just an 'anychurch' message. Penicuik South Parish Church needs to learn to focus more on what's right and less on what's yet to improve. As a church we certainly need to address our weaknesses; but individually improving our simple straight-forward thankfulness is a real issue. This is genuinely something we need to get right more than we presently are. Heard this kind of thing before? That's the wrong question! Have you done this kind of thing before is what you really need to be asking.

## News From Kirk Session

Pastoral Visitation has begun within the congregation and it is hoped that the Gift Counselling will identify more visitors.

Anne Hamilton has stood down as Presbytery Elder and Session extended its sincere thanks to Anne for her dedication and commitment. The new Presbytery elder is Lindsay Swan. Anne reported from Presbytery that Rev. Bill Thomson has died. (Bill led some of our services during our vacancy.) A letter of condolence has been sent from the congregation.

Following the congregation decision to move to a Unitary Constitution, committees within the Church will now be asked to attend occasional Session Meetings or submit reports to cover their area of service. The 'Minibus Project Group' has made a slight change to their original purpose. The money raised will be used to support the hire of minibuses for use by the Church and congregation.

The Crèche will now begin after the extended period of worship. However parents wishing to take their children through to the Fellowship area can do so when S-Club children depart for West St.

The Session will have a 'weekend meeting', hopefully in October, which will be led by Steve Goss from Freedom in Christ and the discussion topic will be Corporate Strongholds.

The evening offering should be given in the same way as in the morning and Office Bearers are asked to inform their teams of this change. Bill Bruce reported that Saturday work parties are not well attended as previously but extended his thanks to John and Mary Darling for clearing the fallen ivy from the church wall.

The wiring system in the church is being inspected and a report will be received shortly. Session approved the conversion of the church clock to electric power and this will avoid someone having to climb the tower to wind it up. Session is considering some quotes for improving the overhead system.

Session will meet on 21st June to further discuss the Phyllis Wilson bequest.

We are meeting monthly now on a Thursday evening instead of Tuesday and we would ask for the congregation's prayer support that we make every decision in accordance with God's will for our church.

## Church Help in the Community

A friend of mine who lives in West Linton asked me to write about what is happening to help the homeless in Hanley, Stoke-on-Trent near where I live. Hanley is one of the Potteries Towns, but very little pottery is made there now.

Hanley Baptist Church is situated a short distance from the town centre and as in many town and city centres, I am told that there are many on the streets, homeless and drug takers. The pastor of the church told me that about 5 years ago he had a strong calling to do something about the situation.

At the church he – and helpers of course, provide free of any charge a hot two course meal for anyone who wishes to drop in between 6pm and 9pm on a Thursday evening. Rather difficult to cater for an unknown number, but it seems to work out with a consistent number of about seventy coming each week. There are four placards as you walk in – NO ALCOHOL, NO SMOKING, NO DRUGS, NO DEALING.

At 6.30 the meal starts with a grace, a bit more than a grace really: it extends to a prayer which offers help and encouragement to all. There are servers who wait on at the table taking meals to those who have arrived. Each person

books in and is given a raffle ticket (more about this later). Samples of the main course which I have seen served:

Cottage Pie with mixed vegetables and gravy.  
Two chicken drumsticks with stuffing, gravy, veg and roast potatoes  
Sausages with onion gravy, mash and mixed veg.  
Pork, sliced and kept in hot gravy in a large tin in the oven, served with potatoes and mixed veg.  
(Of course they do not have a choice from these meals – just what is being prepared that day.)

On the tables there are loaves of buttered bread for anyone who is especially hungry and needs filling up or wants to mop up the gravy!  
The desserts have been apple pie and custard, Swiss roll and custard, McVities ginger cake and custard and a gateau type cake. (All kept as simple as possible.)

After the meal they can help themselves to tea or coffee from the two urns, and a plate of variety biscuits is put on the table. They chat of course: many seem to know each other, or perhaps some will go to where there are clothes available for them; they are allowed two items. Meanwhile others are coming in, but most do come between 6 and 6.30pm.

On the way out they hand in their raffle ticket (mentioned earlier) and are then given a carrier bag containing a packed lunch for the next day – four rounds of buttered bread with cheese and some

onions on, a wrapped chocolate biscuit and a bottle of orange juice. (Empty bottles are collected from a leisure centre by one of the helpers who takes them home to wash and then fills them with orange squash.)

There are four of us from our local Methodist church who go on a Thursday on a rota basis – sometimes only two, but better to have at least three. Our job is to make up the food bags in a side room. Can you imagine buttering up seventeen loaves of bread!

I asked the pastor, Trevor what it all costs - he told me all the bread is donated (by Tesco's I think) perhaps one day out of date, but still quite fresh and other food is given, or sold at a very reasonable price. Trevor says that each week it costs about £100 – and that it comes from God! Some donations are made directly by other local churches in the area – our church also have a box for donations of groceries or clothing. I don't know much about how the books balance out.

Everything is done as simply as possible, such as using catering packs of instant custard powder, frozen mixed veg and tinned boiled potatoes (no potatoes to peel). The main part of the meal is prepared by Trevor himself at home and brought in hot at about 5.30pm. His wife works part-time. They are well organised in the kitchen with plates always hot (important, I think) and the kitchen is well equipped with a dish washer, a large cooker, a central table

and a serving hatch. Over the five year period when they have been doing this they must have developed their own system of doing it all efficiently.

I think this is a wonderful service which the church offers; it is just sad this sort of thing is necessary. There is a similar body in Hanley called "Arch" where one of our local ladies used to help doing meals, but now they are concentrating on working with the local authorities trying to set up some of these unfortunate people in a house or flat and assisting with starter packs of blankets, towels, sleeping bags, pots and crockery etc. as well as a box of groceries.

I believe there are other such bodies around the country doing similar work – I am told there is a very good one in Bradford. Well, I hope this gives you an idea of what is being done in Hanley.

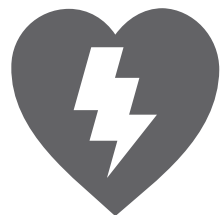

## Swimming with the Sharks!

My daughter, Alice, is joining a volunteer expedition to Australia in the summer. She will be working with rescued wallabies with a Frontier (non-profit organisation) supported project. She is currently studying Zoology at Glasgow University & while this project will benefit the many injured wallabies needing help it will also give her the valued experience and connections needed to progress into a Zoological career after university.

Although the wallabies (& kangaroos) are protected by law in Australia, it is easy to obtain a permit that allows individuals to shoot & kill these animals for commercial & non-commercial purposes.

Although there are guidelines or a "code of conduct" in place that seek to ensure as humane a death as possible for the animals, this does not always protect marsupials from suffering. Many are shot in the neck or chest, causing a slow, painful death, or snared in traps where they will slowly starve.

Often if a mother is killed as a pest the Joey in her pouch will eventually die as it has no way of looking after itself. Due to their curious & fearless natures, thousands of wallabies are

also involved with road traffic accidents & seriously injured as a result. The centre Alice will be involved with seeks to rescue injured or orphaned wallabies, tend to their needs & nurse them to good health.

In order to help fund this expedition Alice is participating in a Shark Encounter (dive) at Deep Sea World, North Queensferry on the 14th June 2009.

We are on the frontline!

Who will we be Jesus to?

God uses the weak.

See the community we live in through the eyes of Jesus.

Demonstrate Gods Love in practical ways.

God is engaged in our community, so we should be too.

Talk to People.
